

Key achievements from the 2020-21 academic year:	Areas for further improvement:
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> A large amount of the Primary Sports Premium Funding was spent successfully on further improving the quality of our school's P.E. provision, equipment and opportunities (see spending review document on the school website for more information on impact and outcomes). The remaining money is being 'rolled over' to the new academic year. C.J. and G.F. successfully completed their Primary P.E. Specialist qualification. P.E. Governor (C. Jones) observed several different P.E. based lessons, activities and trips/competitions, as well as having a meeting with C.J. to discuss P.E. provision across the school. C.J. continued to mentor an apprentice who was successful in achieving their Teaching Assistant and Sports Leader qualifications. Despite minimal opportunities, two of the school sports teams continued to have a 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Adapt the curriculum provision for the forthcoming year (2021-22) to ensure that the children haven't missed out on key skills and opportunities that they might not have chance to access during the 2020-21 academic year, due to the school closing as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic. sporting success at Level 2 inter-school tournaments, including; the girls' football team winning Kidderminster Harriers' F.C.'s Football tournament, with the boys' team also performing well, with limited opportunities to play together.

- Again there was a number of different activities planned which include sports festivals, residential trips and/or competitions that all year groups were due to take part in, but were unable to do so due to the school closure and enforced restrictions.
- All children had the opportunity to take part in two socially distanced House Cross Country competitions, a House Fitness Challenge, as well as a successful Olympic & Paralympic themed 'World Week', where the children took part in Water Polo, Gymnastics, Skipping and Drama workshops all based around the Olympic and Paralympic Games.

- To continue to give targeted groups (including SEND, FSM & Pupil Premium, EAL, Girls) of children the opportunity to develop their own spatial awareness and motor co-ordination skills.
- To continue to give as many children as possible throughout the school the opportunity to participate in as wide a variety as possible of different inter-school sporting events and competitions.
- To continue to develop and improve children's teamwork and leadership skills.

We provided additional swimming sessions for the children who missed their school swimming lessons in 2020 and 2021 (due to the enforced leisure centre closures), as well as providing some extra sessions for some Year 6 children in order to give them the chance to meet the national curriculum swimming requirements.

To use the Primary Sports Premium Funding to pay for a Sports Assistant who will help to develop the children's social, emotional and behavioural skills through sporting activities. Apprenticeship programs are widely accepted as a good way of training a person on how to become a successful Sports Assistant, whilst also providing a number of benefits for the school at the same time, some of which include; having an extra adult to support children within class, providing a young positive (male/female) role model for all children in the school as well as having an additional sports specialist who can support class teachers and/or teaching assistants during lessons and pass on their own sporting knowledge and experience.	St. Barnabas C.E. Primary School has already run five successful apprenticeship programs in previous years, with previous Sports Apprentices qualifying and either being kept on as a Teaching/Sports Assistant within the school, or moving on to further develop their career in sports teaching/coaching. This model has proved to be a successful and sustainable way of continuing to provide quality P.E. support within St. Barnabas C.E. Primary School. Mr. Jenkinson mentored another sports apprentice throughout the 2019-20 and 2020-21 academic years, during the Covid-19 pandemic. The apprentice was successful in completing the course and also achieved her Teaching Assistant qualification, as well as her Outdoor Sports Leader award too. This also meant that she was able to support the children at school, both in class as well as outside during playtimes, lunchtimes as well as in P.E. lessons too.	As a result of completing the apprenticeship at St. Barnabas C.E. Primary School, this enabled last year's sports apprentice to get a job as a Teaching Assistant at another local primary school, which suggests that the sports apprenticeship programme is a useful and beneficial programme to both the apprentice and the school. However, we were able to successfully offer a Yoga workshop to Year 3 children, a full day of Skipping workshops to most year groups, as well as a number of other activities that took place during our Olympic and Paralympic themed 'World Week'.</p> <p>Specialist sports coaching in schools is able to resume in the 2021-22 academic year, so we will be able to provide specialist sports coaching to children in school from Kidderminster Harriers Football Club, Worcestershire County Cricket Club, as well as through a coach from SALTO Gymnastics Club.</p>	We will continue to offer specialist coaching by the relevant qualified practitioners to as many children as possible in sports/activities where we cannot provide this specialist coaching ourselves, as it is hugely beneficial to the children who receive it.
